Executive Summary

Overview

While celebrated for their diversity, many Brooklyn neighborhoods are also characterized by racial segregation and attendant harmful effects on health and related outcomes. The COVID-19 crisis has exacerbated these longstanding challenges. People of color are dying from COVID-19 at twice the rate of whites and are less likely to be tested or get vaccinated. Although COVID-19 infection, testing, and vaccine data in NYC overall is showing a positive outlook, the same is not true for Brooklyn. As of February 8, 2021, the number of daily new cases (1,168); deaths (6,853); and hospitalizations (23,583) have either remained stable or increased week-to-week.

Community Care of Brooklyn/Maimonides Medical Center (CCB/MMC) supports community-driven interventions that address social determinants of health, thereby strengthening individuals and communities and improving economic conditions that make people especially vulnerable during times like the COVID-19 crisis. In order to learn more about a) the range of barriers to testing and vaccination; and b) the most effective ways of communicating about testing and vaccination, we at Brooklyn Communities Collaborative activated our network of Wellness Empowerment for Brooklyn (WEB) Participatory Action Research (PAR) youth researchers.

Research Methodology

From January 27th - February 1, 2021, a team of 22 WEB youth researchers conducted a brief survey on experiences and perspectives with COVID-19 testing and vaccination with more than 1,600 Brooklynites. Each of the youth researchers participated in previous PAR community studies sponsored by CCB/MMC and have been trained in the social determinants of health, NYC DOHMH community health profiles, and PAR methodology.

The seven-question survey tool was designed by CCB/MMC with input from community stakeholders. The youth researchers were prepared to conduct the survey via virtual information and training sessions during which key facts about COVID-19, testing and vaccination were presented to them by a MMC doctor, who also answered questions from the team. The team was then trained on how to conduct the surveys and enter the data. (see p. 11 for the survey questions)

The team conducted the surveys using their social networks, beginning with their peers and family members living in Brooklyn ages 16+. All survey results were entered in an anonymous online form by the students. Upon conclusion of the survey period, CCB/MMC facilitated a virtual focus group for the youth researchers during which CCB/MMC staff and youth researchers discussed and documented the qualitative aspects of carrying out the survey and the range of responses to its open-ended questions.

Overall Survey Findings


Our respondents

Survey respondents live in neighborhoods across Brooklyn, with the highest percentages in Sunset Park, Flatbush, Flatlands, Borough Park and Canarsie.


Age

Most of respondents were between 18-44 years old, with 58% between 16-25; and 19% between 24-34 years old.




Race

Most of our respondents were Black (40.4%). More than 23% percent of respondents were Asian, including South Asian; 16.2% were Hispanic/Latinx; 10% Arab/Middle Eastern; and 8.9% were white.




Gender

Nearly fifty-five percent (54.7%) of respondents were female, 41.7% male. The remaining were non-binary, transgender or preferred not to say,




Direct experience with COVID-19

Sixty-one percent of our respondents had direct experience with COVID-19: 21% of respondents contracted COVID-19 themselves; 21% reporting that a household member contracted COVID-19. Thirty-nine percent of our respondents did not have direct experience with COVID-19, meaning that they themselves did not contract the virus, nor did their close friends or family members.



Public-facing workers


Thirty-six percent of respondents were public facing workers.



Those respondents who were public-facing workers, however, and who generally face greater risk of infection, were not more inclined to want to be vaccinated. Just 35% of respondents who were also public facing workers indicated that they plan to be vaccinated, a rate lower than those surveyed who are not public facing workers, 42% of whom indicated that they plan to be vaccinated.

Testing

More than half (55.4%) of respondents were tested for COVID-19. Of the respondents who WERE TESTED, the most common responses were that they were tested because 1) they were exposed to someone who tested positive (41.4%); 2) because they were not feeling well (36.1%); and that the test was mandated by their job (24.9%).



Of those respondents who were NOT TESTED, the top three reasons indicated were: 1) that they haven't felt sick; 2) that they heard that the test was a very uncomfortable/painful experience; and 3) that they were worried about being exposed to others who might have COVID-19 while at a testing site.


How respondents would improve the testing experience


We asked respondents in an open-ended format about how they would improve the testing experience. The majority expressed a need for better accessibility to, and efficiency at, testing centers. They also suggested more efficient and comfortable testing methods. Some respondents proposed that testing sites add additional staff to streamline efficiency through decreased wait time and long lines. Respondents also remarked on a need for better social distancing in testing locations, improved bedside manner, and a general increase in available information on the testing procedure. One respondent went as far as to compare their testing experience to Black Friday shopping.

Vaccination


Just 10.7% of respondents had received the vaccine. This low rate is likely due to the young age of our respondents, as well as the scarcity of the vaccine during the survey period.

We asked those who had not yet been vaccinated whether they planned to be vaccinated, or if they were unsure. While 40.1% of respondents indicated that yes, they did plan to be vaccinated, 59.9% either did not plan to be vaccinated, or were unsure.






We asked those who do not want to be vaccinated, or who are unsure, what best describes their hesitation. Concern about side effects, and about the safety of the vaccine because it was produced so quickly were the most commonly indicated causes of hesitation.



In our review of 'other' responses and during our debriefing session with the research team we noted that, citing unknown long-term effects of the vaccine, respondents who were pregnant or have future plans of starting a family were hesitant towards the vaccine. The issue of mistrust regarding information on the COVID-19 vaccine was a common theme; specifically, respondents replied that they did not "trust the government" or that "social media has been putting up an image of the vaccine being unsafe." Finally, some respondents claimed that while they did want to get the vaccine, they had already faced difficulties scheduling an appointment and were worried about accessibility going forward.

Most trusted sources of information about COVID-19

The three most trusted sources of information about COVID-19 among survey respondents were doctors/medical professionals (79.5%), the NYC Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (50.9%), and the Centers for Disease Control (49%).



There was some variation on trusted sources of information about COVID-19 by race, with Asians and South Asians indicating greater trust in the CDC over the NYC DOHMH; and Hispanics indicating greater trust in close friends and family members over the CDC or the NYC DOHMH.

Review of responses to the "other" option for this question showed a general lack of confidence in who to trust for information about COVID-19, with specific mistrust of political leaders.

Most effective ways of communicating to the most people

When asked to select the TOP THREE most effective ways of communicating to the most people about COVID-19 testing and vaccination, respondents overall indicated: healthcare providers (57.9%); Facebook (9.7%); and Tik Tok (6.8%).

Questions and suggestions from survey respondents

At the survey's end, respondents were asked whether they had any big questions and/or whether there was anything they would like to add. The points below summarize key themes:

- Is it possible to get COVID-19 twice?
- Is the vaccine safe and what is its general make-up?
- What is the best way to get reliable information on the vaccine?

- Will the vaccine be mandated by the government in the future?
- What are the best ways to receive updates about vaccine eligibility for general and younger populations?
- Will mask wearing and quarantining be necessary with the vaccine?
- Are there non-computerized ways for scheduling appointments, especially for elderly populations?
- Can vaccine trucks be used for home delivery?

Regarding messaging and communication platforms, respondents suggested using culturally-specific social media, for example "WeChat" for Chinese communities. One respondent suggested disseminating this information in the same format as AMBER alerts.

Feedback from Youth Survey Team

After completing the surveying processes the survey team re-grouped virtually to give more insights on their overall surveying experience. The team surveyed mostly their family, friends, and friends' parents. They expressed that conducting the surveys made them realize that the impacts of COVID-19 were more wide-spread than they initially thought, even that there were even deaths within families that they were unaware of. Some team members described the severe toll that has been taken on people's mental health.

Surveyors noted that some respondents were scared to take the vaccine because of what they heard from family members, friends, and health care professionals. Some were told that the vaccine would make them sicker, cause them to develop the virus, cause paralysis, and/or lead to infertility. These misconceptions stress the need for clearer and more accessible information on the COVID-19, the vaccine for it, and vaccines in general.

The youth survey team also provided suggestions on improving the testing experience for COVID-19 by having outdoor tents, heating/air conditioning systems, and a sign-in and text system to aid in the efficiency and comfort of the testing process. The youth survey team was pleased to be a part of the RAPID PAR project because they feel as though they are helping to make a change within communities that need it most during these unprecedented times.

Community Profiles

Among all survey respondents, some consistent findings and themes were identified:

- Most Brooklyn residents had not been tested for COVID-19 because they have not felt sick but plan to be vaccinated when eligible.
- People who said no or were unsure about getting the COVID-19 vaccine once eligible were commonly worried about the side effects.
- Across each neighborhood, the most trusted source of information was doctors and medical professionals, followed by the CDC and the NYC Health Department.

However, some individual neighborhoods presented unique findings and opportunities for outreach:

- 31% of Black/African American respondents in East Flatbush and 68% of Black/African American respondents in East New York stated that they feel more comfortable with natural/herbal remedies as opposed to receiving the vaccine
- In Bensonhurst Bay Ridge, only 33% of Arab/Middle Eastern respondents planned to be vaccinated once eligible. 52% said this decision was based on spiritual or religious beliefs.

Bedford Stuyvesant – Crown Heights


The following data shows that most surveyed Bedford Stuyvesant – Crown Heights residents had not been tested for COVID-19 because they did not feel sick. More than half of residents surveyed (52%) did not plan to be vaccinated once eligible; the other half were split, with 23% saying they plan to be vaccinated and 25% saying they were not sure. This was not true across all racial or ethnic groups surveyed: the majority of Hispanic/Latinx respondents (60%) said that they plan to be vaccinated once eligible. The most common response (67%) for not wanting to take the COVID-19 vaccine was the concern about the side effects. The most trusted source of information about COVID-19 in Bedford Stuyvesant – Crown Heights were doctors or medical professionals. The majority of Bedford-Stuyvesant respondents ranked healthcare providers as the first, second, and third most effective way to reach the most people. Email, Instagram, and Facebook were the top second and third ratings after healthcare providers.

Bensonhurst – Bay Ridge


The following data shows that most surveyed Bensonhurst – Bay Ridge residents had not been tested for COVID-19 because they did not feel sick. The majority of respondents (60%) plan to be vaccinated once eligible, especially across Asian, Black/African American, Hispanic/Latinx, and White/Caucasian respondents. However, Arab/Middle Eastern respondents had the smallest percentage (33%) planning to be vaccinated once eligible. Arab/Middle Eastern respondents were also unique in their allusion to religious or cultural beliefs as the reason for not wanting to be vaccinated, selecting "I don't think I need it based on my spiritual/religious beliefs" (52% of respondents) and "I am very skeptical or Western medicine" (52% of respondents). However, the most common response (75%) as the reason for not wanting to take the COVID-19 vaccine was concern about the side effects. The most trusted source of information about COVID-19 in Bensonhurst — Bay Ridge were doctors or medical professionals. Interestingly, White/Caucasian respondents in this neighborhood were the only group to rate the CDC higher than the NYC Health Department as a trusted source of information about COVID-19. The majority of respondents in Bensonhurst — Bay Ridge ranked healthcare providers as the most effective way to reach the most people. Instagram (25), Facebook (23), and YouTube (20) were ranked second and email third.



Borough Park


The following data shows that most surveyed Borough Park residents had not been tested for COVID-19 because they did not feel sick. The majority of respondents (55%) plan to be vaccinated once eligible, especially across Asian, Hispanic/Latinx, and White/Caucasian respondents. However, Black/African American respondents were the most divided in their responses – yes (21%), no (29%), I'm not sure (50%). The most common response (74%) for not taking the COVID-19 vaccine was concern about the side effects. Notably, more than a third of Arab/Middle Eastern respondents (37%) identified trust as a barrier to getting vaccinated. The most trusted source of information about COVID-19 in Borough Park were doctors or medical professionals. Interestingly, while most respondents heavily preferred doctors/medical professionals, Black/African American respondents were the most divided into their responses – doctors/medical professionals (64%), NYC Health Department (50%), I'm not sure (43%). The majority of Borough Park respondents ranked healthcare providers as the most effective way to reach the most people. An even distribution of Tik Tok, Instagram, and Facebook were ranked second and third.





Canarsie – Flatlands

The following data shows that most surveyed Canarsie – Flatlands residents had not been tested for COVID-19 because they did not feel sick. Notably, the only respondents who chose "I heard that it is a very uncomfortable/painful experience" as a barrier to getting tested were Black/African American. The majority of respondents do not plan to be vaccinated once eligible (43%) or were not sure (37%). The most common response (75%) as a reason for not wanting to take the COVID-19 vaccine was concern about the side effects. The most trusted source of information about COVID-19 in Borough Park were doctors or medical professionals. The majority of Canarsie-Flatlands respondents ranked healthcare providers as the most effective way to reach the most people. Instagram was ranked second. Healthcare providers were also the most likely to be selected as the third most effective way to reach the most people, followed by YouTube (27) and Instagram (26).



Coney Island – Sheepshead Bay


The following data shows that most surveyed Coney Island – Sheepshead Bay residents had not been tested for COVID-19 because they did not feel sick. 21% of residents surveyed did not plan to be vaccinated once eligible. The most common response (68%) for not wanting to take the COVID-19 vaccine was concern about the side effects. The most trusted source of information about COVID-19 in Coney Island – Sheepshead Bay were doctors or medical professionals. The majority of respondents in Coney Island and Sheepshead Bay ranked healthcare providers as the most effective way to reach the most people. Facebook was ranked second, and Tik Tok was rated third.


The following data shows that most surveyed Downtown Brooklyn residents had not been tested for COVID-19 because they did not feel sick. 27% of residents surveyed did not plan to be vaccinated once eligible; 35% saying they plan to be vaccinated, and 38% saying they were not sure. The most common response (85%) as a reason for not wanting to take the COVID-19 vaccine was concern about the side effects. 
The following data shows that most surveyed East Flatbush residents (82%) had not been tested for COVID-19 because they did not feel sick. Nearly half of residents surveyed (47%) did not plan to be vaccinated once eligible; the other half were split, with 33% saying they plan to be vaccinated and 20% saying they were not sure. This was not true across all racial or ethnic groups surveyed: the majority of Arab/Middle Eastern, Asian, and Hispanic/Latinx respondents said that they plan to be vaccinated once eligible. Conversely, 53% of the Black/African American population stated they do not intend to vaccinate. The most common response (78%) for not wanting to take the COVID-19 vaccine was concern about the side effects. 31% of the Black/African American respondents stated that they feel more comfortable with natural/herbal remedies as opposed to receiving the vaccine. The most trusted source of information about COVID-19 in East Flatbush were doctors or medical professionals. The majority of respondents in East Flatbush and Flatbush ranked healthcare providers as the most effective way to reach the most people. Instagram was rated second, and YouTube (41) and Instagram (37) were rated third.




The following data shows that most surveyed East New York residents (84%) had not been tested for COVID-19 because they did not feel sick. 33% of residents surveyed did not plan to be vaccinated once eligible; the remaining respondents were split, with 25% saying they plan to be vaccinated and 42% saying they were not sure. The most common response (82%) as a reason for not wanting to take the COVID-19 vaccine was concern about the side effects. While it didn't resonate as an overall top choice for all respondents, 68% of the Black/African American surveyed stated that they feel more comfortable with natural/herbal remedies as opposed to receiving the vaccine. 




